Our ordinary time promises to be anything but ordinary.

Pastor's Passage The Love of My Life

"Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs." 1 Corinthians 13:4-5

Last month, I shared with you a story about my best friend, Chris. I talked about how our friendship pre-dated my relationship with Mary. In the story I wrote, "You could say that I brought Chris along with me when Mary and I made our connection in 1977." I also stated, "After college, Chris moved to Colorado and I eventually moved back home, where I re-met Mary (that's another story) and got married."

As Paul Harvey used to say, "And now the rest of the story." I would like to share with you my story about Mary, the love of my life and my best friend.

Mary and I went to high school together. I was two years ahead of her. We knew of each other but that was all. After graduating in 1970, I left for college. I attended two colleges without graduating. College was just one big party for me. My drinking quickly escalated along with my use of pot. It is rather amazing that I never flunked out and after six years I just quit.

I was fortunate that my parents let me move home in October 1976. I believed a change of scenery would "cure" me of my bad habits. Unfortunately, I brought myself along when I moved home and nothing really changed.

On April 9, 1977, the day before Easter, I attended a party with my

sister and that is where I re-met Mary. Another guy at the party was making Mary uncomfortable and she asked my sister for advice. My sister asked her, "Do you remember my brother? He's in the living room sitting on the couch. Go talk with him." Mary sat down next to me and reintroduced herself.

We talked and caught up with each other the rest of the evening. We gave Mary a ride home after the party. My sister drove because I was drunk. When we got to Mary's house, I asked if I could call her the next day. She told me that she and her son, Kenny, would be at her parents for Easter dinner. I asked for the phone number and she told me it was listed in the phonebook (remember those?). Mary didn't think I would remember this conversation, let alone expect me to call. To her surprise, I did call and you could say the rest is history.

Mary's son, Kenny, would turn five in May. Her ex-husband had walked out on them soon after Kenny was born. The three of us bonded pretty quickly. We spent all of our free time together. By the end of May, we talked about getting married in about a year.

That summer, I was playing on a softball team with some high school friends. We had a game on Father's Day June 19, 1977. Before the game, we went to Mary's parents house for a cookout. I asked her dad permission to

marry his daughter. He and Mary's mom gave us their blessing. After the game, we went to my parents house and shared the news with them. They too were excited. On our way to a softball team picnic, Kenny asked if he could tell the team our news. At the picnic, Kenny stood on a picnic table and said, "Hey everyone! I have an announcement to make. My mom and Rick and I are going to get married!"

Later that summer, we decided why wait and got married on October 15, 1977. Within the next couple of years our daughters, Shelby and Stacey, added to our family.

Mary worked at Baldwin-Wallace College (now University) and I finally completed my degree there in 1983. Mary graduated from BW in 1998 after taking one class a quarter for 25 years.

Mary retired from BW on July 1, 2020 after 46 years. I, on the other hand, bounced from job to job throughout our marriage. As I reflect back on this, I realize that I was a functioning alcoholic and "pothead." This meant that after a couple of years my employers got tired of my act and let me go.

Throughout our life together, Mary has been the anchor to our family. Because I was an alcoholic, I was there physically for our family but not emotionally. Mary kept our household

intact and functioning. She, at times, was both a mother and a father to our children. Looking back, I wonder how she did it.

The above scripture from 1 Corinthians is a great definition for the person that Mary has always been. The words from the Apostle Paul describe her to a "T."

The day before Easter in 1998, with Mary's blessing, I quit my job as an assistant manager of a greenhouse. I had worked there since 1990; the longest job tenure I had had during our marriage. I wanted to become a teacher and had already started parttime at BW. I wanted to go full-time and Mary agreed.

That evening at dinner Mary asked if I would like to go to church Easter Sunday. At first, I balked but then said, "ok." We had been absent from church for about 15 years. The Easter morning felt like we were the only people in the sanctuary. The words spoken that morning from the Rev. Oommen Thomas touched our souls. We haven't missed church since that day.

Though our marriage and family seemed ok on the outside we realized that our spiritual connection to God and Jesus Christ was not there. Our souls had been hollowed out in part due to my addictions to alcohol and marijuana. We were good people but I was not the person God created me to be and it took its toll on our family. Without Mary's strength, I hate to think what might have happened.

I did get certified to teach and did so for a year while we remained very active in the church. After one year of teaching, I was hired as Director of Christian Education at our church. My hiring was announced Easter morning in 2000.

By the fall of 2002, my alcoholism had brought on deep depression. Mary encouraged me to get medical help. For once, I listened to her about my drinking and followed through. My journey of sobriety began November 19, 2002. I was miserable but I attended AA meetings and sought counseling. Mary was my pillar of strength and she walked this path with me. Throughout the first 25 years of marriage, Mary never lost hope that I could become the person God created me to be.


Some people might wonder how Mary survived all of this. Why did she put up with me and the effects my addictions had on our family? That is a story she has to share.

Nine months into sobriety and I was enrolled at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.
When I told Mary I believed God was leading me

on this path she responded, "What took you so long to figure it out?"

In recovery, I was able to make amends to Mary, our children, and our families. I believe that Mary's unconditional love and support for me in recovery made my amends easier. Others saw how Mary treated me during this process and this might have influenced others when I offered my apologies for my past behaviors.

God has been a huge part in my life even though I did not recognize His presence for so many years. It started almost 47 years ago when God brought Mary and Kenny into my life. God working through Mary all those years kept us together. Life wasn't always smooth (continued on page 6)



Session

The Session met on March 25, 2024. Highlights of their meeting follow.

- ► The Deacons have had more ride requests recently and are happy to provide them.
- ► The Deacons need some extra help with the Easter Breakfast cooking and clean-up.
- ► Kenzi in the church office manages the church calendar, so bring calendar request to her first.
- ► The February finance report was preliminary, as it needs reconciliation.
- ► Expenses exceeded income in February, primarily due to Property expenses such as the stove repair, toward which Presbyterian Women donated \$1,300.
- Vanguard changed how balances are viewed online, making it more difficult to get specific balances for desired dates.
- The Easter Egg hung went very well with 35-40 kids participating.

- ► The changes to the Sexual Misconduct portion of the Employee Manual were approved.
- HR will provide the annual clergy compensation report to the Presbytery.
- Employee reviews are being conducted.
- Emilee wants to make family activities available after church some Sundays.
- Options for resurfacing the parking lot are being investigated, realizing minimal repairs will not last, so more extensive repairs will need to be funded.
- ► Loans for such improvements are available from the denomination, and a capital campaign would need to be conducted to pay off any loan.
- Mission is supporting the Lorain Community Foundation raffle with some donations.

- ► Holy Week and Easter services have been planned. Candles will be set out for the Taizé style Maundy Thursday Service.
- ► The Nominating Committee is still looking for one elder and one deacon willing to serve.
- Noting that the revised Child Protection Policy had not been approved last year, a motion was passed to approve it.
- A preliminary anti-racism statement was discussed as a basis for starting to create an Anti-Racism Policy for ALPC.
- ► The Ministry Discernment Form completed by the Pastor Nominating Committee was approved with one change.

about her. It was always about our family and others.


You were always the rudder on my drifting ship. You were steering me (with God's help) in the direction I needed to go, even when I didn't want to. Thank you for always believing in me.
