

Pastor's Passage Our Son Kenny

"A son may outgrow your lap, but he will never outgrow your heart." Anonymous

In our April *Saints Alive*, I shared with you my story abut how Mary has been the guiding and loving force in my life. This month I want to share with you a story about our son, Kenny.

The month of May is now upon us. Every May reminds me of our son, Kenny, who was born in May of 1972. Kenny would have been 52 years old this year.

I thought about what to say and I realized the best way I could share the essence of Kenny would be to share with you the words I spoke at his funeral.

A Dad Remembers:

Kenny was a wonderful son. Was.. That sounds really strange. It wasn't supposed to be this way, but it is. The truth is the family knew that this type of gathering was a real possibility ever since Kenny got really sick four years ago and almost (probably should have) died. This was a possibility that

all of us put way back somewhere in our brains and quietly prayed that it would not happen. But this did happen and now we call upon God to hold us up as we navigate the rough seas that we are now sailing.

Kenny's death is truly tragic. I imagine many alcoholic deaths are like this tragic. But that is the nature of the beast. Alcoholism is a life and death struggle that many people face. Kenny's family and friends tried to help: his doctor's tried to help but to no avail. Ultimately, Kenny was the only person who could help Kenny, but the grips of alcoholism were too strong for him to break. Sadly, he did this to himself no matter how hard we all tried to help. That is the nature of the disease. As a recovering alcoholic, I knew of the many challenges that he would face and my heart is broken. But we all have our faults and we all have our weaknesses.

But, we are gathered here to celebrate Kenny's life, not ponder the coulda's, woulda's, and shoulda's. We must give our thanks and praise to God for allowing Kenny to be a part of our lives for the 41 years he was with us. For those of you who are here as support and did not know Kenny, he was a special person and I'm not saying this because I am his dad.

Kenny came into my life a month before his fifth birthday. His "Ma," as he lovingly called Mary, and I became reacquainted in 1977, after knowing each other at Berea High. It was April 9 when we met at a party and by Father's Day that year, Mary and I knew we were going to get married.

Mary announced the news to her family on Father's Day of 1977 and I did the same with my family after playing a softball game. Kenny asked, "Who can I tell?" We all went to a softball team party that evening and on our way, (continued on page 4)



Mary and I told Kenny he could tell the team and their families. I remember being inside the house when someone came in and said Kenny had an announcement to make. We all gathered around the picnic table he had climbed onto and he proudly proclaimed, "Hey, everybody! My mom and Rick and I are going to get married!" That was really cool. That was a hint of the cool person he would grow up to be.

When his sisters Shelby and Stacey came along, he was disappointed one of them was not a little brother. He was 7 when Shelby was born and almost 9 when Stacey was born. He quickly grew out of his disappointment and became the doting and protective and loving big brother to the girls, who always adored and loved him. It was a role he cherished his entire life.

Kenny just loved life. He knew by the age of 14 that he wanted to be a chef and started working at the local Bob's Big Boy right up the street from our house. He attended culinary school at Johnson and Wales University in Rhode Providence. Island. graduated with high honors. He went on to become an excellent chef at a number of reputable establishments in the Cleveland area. If you loved cheesecake. I am told his was to die for. He enjoyed cooking meals for family and friends, the more the better. Watching him cook, you could easily tell that this was what he was destined to do.

Kenny loved the outdoors, especially his Uncle Dick and Aunt Kathy's farm

in Marblehead, Ohio. As a child, our family went up there almost every weekend starting in the spring and continuing through the fall; it was a great place to be. Kenny learned to drive the tractors and farm trucks probably by the time he was 13. It was his and his cousin Ricky's ("E," as Kenny called him rather than Eric or Ricky like the rest of the family) job to mow and maintain the part of the property that was not farmed from an early age (there are 300 acres). I've heard rumors

that Kenny taught his sisters how to drive along the same field roads where he learned, maybe at an even younger age than when he had learned.

He continued to go out there quite often as he got older. He enjoyed the open spaces and the peacefulness of the farm. But, more importantly, he wanted to be with "E," his cousin; he was the brother Kenny never had and their love for each other was deep.

Marblehead was such a special place to Kenny that the family will scatter his ashes out there later this year.

Kenny's other best friend was his Uncle Kevin, who could not be here this day. Kevin is Mary's little brother and just ten years older than Kenny. As Kenny grew up, Kevin took him under his wing and they had many adventures together. One adventure that Kevin shared with me the other night was about the day he and Kenny went down into the Metroparks for a hike. The park system was literally in the Maley's backyard, and Mary and

her siblings regarded the park as their own private domain as they grew up. On this trek, Kevin and Kenny ended up on the railroad trestle that crossed the Rocky River. It stands about 100 feet or so up in the air. When you look up at the tracks, you will see that every so often there are platforms that jut out from the trestle. That day, Kenny and Kevin needed one of those platforms because a train came as they were crossing. Kevin said it was pretty amazing having a train go by close enough to reach out and touch it. (The train moved real slow on this single track.) Kevin has always been special to Kenny and they talked at least once a week.

Kenny also loved dogs. I never allowed our kids to have dogs while growing up. Now sister Stacey has two dogs and Shelby's boys are beginning to bug her and Jason about getting one. Kenny got dogs after finishing culinary school and it was never just one dog and they were never lap dogs, even though all of his dogs thought they

were lap dogs. The word "big" was always an apt description of his dogs and they were always rambunctious, just like Kenny. All of the dogs were rescue dogs except his first, Thor, a huge, beautiful and gentle Akita.

But Kenny's greatest love was his wife Linda and the family she brought into his life. Her daughters Rose and Cori immediately became his daughters. When Cori gave birth to Aiden and Hailey, Kenny loved his role as grandpa. After his first illness, one of his greatest joys was caring for Aiden during the day. Kenny loved people and would do anything for you. He cared more about others than himself. I could go on and on and on... We will miss him very much.

We all wanted a miracle when his health began to deteriorate late last week. After the miracle never came, I began to realize (for myself, anyway) that the miracle *did* occur but it was four years ago when Kenny first pulled through his illness. We were blessed with four more years of his presence, his laughter, his smile, and his love.

This past week has been tough for all of us. Dealing with death is always hard. Why do things like this occur—a person dying at such a young age? A parent burying their child? I don't really know. My answer today is no better than it was when I eulogized the son of a family friend the day before his 16th birthday.

I take a deep breath and do my best to trust in God, trusting that God is always present even when I feel alone, giving me strength when I am weak, comforting me even during my times of despair.

I do know that everything in God's world has a cycle. We can see it in the way the seasons change. Life for us is also cyclical. We are born into it as God breathes life into us as we exit the womb. We live our lives to the best of our ability and, at some point, we return to the One who created us.

Accepting life on life's terms can be hard. It is during these hard times that I have encountered God. I have found that God won't leave me in "the valley of the shadow of death." I may ignore God and choose to be in the darkness for a long time, but God will always be there with me, trying to give me comfort, holding me in the palm of his hand. That is one thing about God: we may forget about him, but God will

Jesus' death and resurrection tells us that death, no matter how final it may seem to us here on earth, does not have the final day. Life here on earth is just the beginning, a brief stop along our timeline.

Jesus told his disciples and all of us that there are many rooms in his Father's house and that he will prepare a place for us. This is the place where Kenny now resides, in the eternal realm free of any pain and at home with the loving God who created him.

Rest in peace my son, rest in peace. Thanks be to God, amen.

The Session met on April 15, 2024. Highlights of the meeting follow.

- ► The Deacons plan and assist other committees with monthly fellowship activities, including a Crusher's game in May and a corn roast in July.
- ► In March, giving was behind expenses, eroding the YTD surplus.
- The April gas bill was paid in March, making the utilities expense seem high.
- Approved Cornerstone to change from a savings account to a better Money Market account.
- The carpet in the foyer needs to be replaced, as it has well outlasted its expected lifespan, so quotes will be sought.
- A second contractor for upgrading the parking lot will be providing a quote.

- Pastor Rick has looked into the Presbyterian Investment Loan Program in case we need to finance these projects.
- Cornerstone Preschool will hold their graduation ceremony on May 23.
- Children's Sermons are currently provided every other Sunday.
- ► Family Sundays are planned for April 28 and May 26. A young adult volunteer has been recruited to work with the youth group.
- Graduating seniors will be recognized one Sunday, so families are asked to send in their photos and bios.
- A Vacation Bible School with a music theme will be held June 17-21 and volunteers are being sought for multiple functions, not just musical leadership.
- ► The local portion of the Pentecost Offering will go to Camp Imagine,

- and a speaker from Camp Imagine will come give a presentation.
- Please let the Evangelism Committee know of any updates that should be made to the pew brochures.
- We will be marching in the Memorial Day parade and will hand out candy and dog treats.
- ► The service on Pentecost Sunday is being planned. Everyone wear red!
- Pastor Rick has been assisting the Nominating Committee, which still seeks one elder and one deacon.
- ► If you would be interested in helping Session compose an antiracism policy, please let them know.
- Improvements to our church's internet system are being proposed.
- New members of Session will start serving in June.

The Property Committee has been busy with repairs and maintenance of our church facility. Just like your home, there seems to be more and more repairs or parts worn out as the building ages.


In January, we invited anyone interested in helping with repairs to meet the second Saturday of the




Descending Dove Maze

patience and hope





Witnessing the transformative power of God in the lives of our students has been a source of profound inspiration, and we eagerly anticipate the continued impact He will have on them in the future.


YOUTHFUL EVENTS

Just like we have adult small groups, Youth Missions are small teen groups that meet occasionally with a youth leader for discipleship, aiming to help them apply and embody the teachings from Youth Group. These teen small groups engage in different activities beyond Sunday night gatherings, such Bible study, participating in community service, creating care packages for college students and elder in need, and serving our surrounding community by providing clean-ups, grocery service yard in-home assistance, cleaning services, etc. Youth missions are a great way to take what we learn from Youth group and apply them to serve others and to actively implement our faithful teaching into our lives.

Although we projected a deficit for the year, we are starting off the year in a positive position. However, there were many prepaid yearly pledges so the giving will even out as we move through the year. Through the end of March, giving is \$10,000 above budget and expenses are also \$2,300 above budget. Please help us to stay strong
